Dear Members,

I am proud to say that 2014 was a banner year for the Carver County Historical Society. We saw substantial growth in attendance and membership, continued solid financial management, exciting exhibitions, and completion of several important projects. Here are just a few highlights of the great things accomplished this year by our exceptional Executive Director and Staff:

Education and Exhibition We successfully launched new school programs in 2014. In accordance with new Minnesota State Education standards released in 2013, we revised the topics and the increased emphasis on STEM education, the CCHS re-vamped its education offerings. Twenty-two new programs were added to those programs already offered.

Thanks to a grant won in 2013, the Storyland exhibition from the Saint Paul Children's museum traveled to Carver County in 2014 and was a HUGE success, with over 1100 visitors during its 4 month stay with us. Overall, we served more than 11,482 visitors, an increase of 3,319 from last year.

But it's not just about serving visitors at our physical location. In late 2014, we launched a brand new – and greatly improved – website to serve the online community in Carver County and beyond. This includes online access to our enormous collection of historical photos, enabling researchers, genealogists and members to browse the full collection from anywhere in the world.

Membership and Fundraising We added 65 new members in 2014, bringing our total active membership to 773. Thank you to all our members for your continued support of the CCHS and its mission.

Also, thanks to the tireless work of our Executive Director and Staff, grants received in 2014 totaled \$50,090. In addition, the annual fund drive was very successful raising more than \$5,959 to help ensure the mission of the Carver County Historical Society will continue for years to come.

Publication We published our first book, *Two Wars on the Frontier*, now in its 2nd printing and available in the gift shop and on Amazon. This effort brought an important story with invaluable – and local – historical perspective to the public.

Staff Tremendous thanks and congratulations are due to our Director and Staff for a successful 2014. A special word of thanks to Marlene Magnuson, who retired after 16+ years of service to the CCHS. We'll miss you, Marlene.

Looking forward to 2015 and beyond, I anticipate we will have many more exciting developments to share with you. Whether through our newsletter, on the new website, or in person when you visit us, we look forward to keeping you informed and involved. And please don't hesitate to share your thoughts, questions or ideas regarding any way we can improve our ability to serve our members and our community now and in the future.

In all my 27+ years in the history field, I have never had a year like this one, and I hope I never have another. It has been a year of firsts. The fact that I am still sane is a tribute to my resilience and more importantly to my passion, belief, and commitment to the CCHS mission.

Donations are important. No matter how large or small they are, they are all treated as the most treasured gift we can receive. This was the case with Ward Holasek's gift of 51+ acres of farm land. He had met twice with the board and stated he wanted us to use the gift for public good. He trusted us to follow those directions and 2014 tested our ability to do so. After he died, in December of 2013, his will was contested. An agreement was made in November, 2014. At the time of this writing, we are waiting attorneys to agree on the language in the document before it can be signed. Once signed, a press release will be sent out and we will be free to discuss things in more detail.

Dewey Thorbeck is working on the long range strategic plan for the farm. The steering committee is comprised of Richard Scott, Peter Gustafson, Burt Johnson, Wendy Petersen Biorn, and Eve Weipert. The Committee is aware that part of the planning involves looking for ways to produce income for the maintenance of the property. Apple trees will be planted by our Swedish friends when they visit. As the plan develops, we will do all we can to keep you, our members, informed and receive your input.

We launched a new website with the guidance of Creature Works. This website has wonderful new features for researchers. Included are plat maps and the ability for members to research photos on line. This is culmination of two years of surveys, sent to members in renewal letters.

Storyland: A Trip Through Childhood Favorites was a wildly successful traveling exhibit, designed for ages 0 through 8 years. This brain child of Heidi Gould resulted in attendance that at times reached over 100 children in less than an hour. Heidi also rewrote most of her educational programming to reflect the new STEM state education standards and the changing focus of each grade's lessons. The total increase for visitation for these two projects reflected in an increase in attendance of 3107 people. This computes to a 38% increase. A job well done Heidi.

Long time researcher Marlene Magnuson retired last spring. We had often talked about her retirement so that she could spend time with her husband, Dale. Unfortunately, Dale passed away several months after her retirement.

Marilyn Braun joined our staff, as researcher, following Marlene retirement. She has been a wonderful addition.

Darlene Fasching and I edited the CCHS's first self-published book, *Two Wars on the Frontier*. The book is composed of AJ Carlson's US/Dakota War and Civil War journals. The first printing sold out in 4 months. The second printing arrived shortly before Christmas.

The 75th anniversary of the Carver County Historical Society occurs in 2015. With the farm negotiations behind us, it is quite exciting to think what the next few years will bring. I have to wonder what OD Sell would think if he saw us today.

Wow, what a year! You, our members, are to be thanked for much of what I was able to accomplish. Since starting here, I have heard that you want greater access to the photo collection. Thanks to a lot of volunteer and staff hours, our photo collection is now accessible from our website. Over 13,000 photos are available and more will be added over time. I welcome feedback about what you like, don't like, and how user friendly it is.


Thanks to the help of interns and volunteers, we expanded the permanent exhibit about our farming roots. *Minnesota Made* highlights the many experiments of early settlers to grow crops in this harsh environment. Not only did Carver residents grow alfalfa, sorghum, apples and grapes but Carver County residents also won international awards for butter making. This exhibit was personal for me because the county is losing farmland to new developments. One of these new developments is at the corner of Hwy 5 and Galpin Road. This area is where the Lyman farm stood. Lyman was instrumental in bringing Grimm alfalfa to the world's attention.

Not only have exhibits changed, rotated, and expanded, but the collections continue to grow. We received a large donation of materials from the creamery in Waconia. The building went into receivership and the Carver County Historical Society was given first access to anything in the building. The records for the Waconia Implement Company and Wagoner Well Drilling are now safely stored and available to researchers. The Historical Society accepted records from the City of Cologne and Laketown Township which are available in the Research Library. Among other donations, the Historical Society accepted seven military uniforms covering all branches, from WW II through Vietnam. Overall, we had 73 donations ranging from stock certificates of local creameries, to stuffed animals made in Chanhassen, to a metal postal stamp from the Waconia Post Office.

A Legacy grant was won to send the German Reading Society banner, an early acquisition of O.D. Sell, to a conservator for restoration. It should be back in time for Stiftungsfest next summer.

2014 was a busy year, but with the help of volunteers and staff, we continue to tell and collect the stories of the county.

My position of library researcher began on May 19, 2014. Some of our volunteers have been serving our CCHS library a long time and I can't thank these people enough for making my transition much easier. Their help identifying areas we could improve has been greatly appreciated.

In 2014, we completed an audit of the 2013 library inventory, prior to putting the list onto our new website. The website now allows members access to our

photo collection, something visitors and members both had been asking for. With this addition, we expect our numbers to continue to increase and anticipate welcoming a growing clientele in 2015.

Together as a team, our volunteers and I have worked on compiling procedures for every task undertaken within the Library. Each process needed to be tweaked several times. This has already brought about greater task consistency and cut down on training times for new volunteers.

MANY... have been working since July on organizing the newspaper index card file drawers. This will be a long term task due to the time required to sort the cards and condensing all "like" info from many multiple cards onto only ONE card, whenever possible. The result is more room in the drawers and a great time savings for our clients when seeking specific info regarding their research subject.


In August, every department pulled together to provide our Carver County Fair goers with an over the top display in the CCHS granary. Our focus for 2014 was schools... the buildings, one room school houses, districts and more.

In the past, there were times when a person would visit the library and discover there was no one available to help them. This problem has been solved by having all volunteers, who spend 'regular' time in the Research Library, be cross trained to assist with most tasks and visitor requests. Since implementing this process, our cross training has provided coverage for "every" shift- - directly within the Library.

In 2014, the Research Library served 273 walk-in clients and received 375 research requestsfrom all across the nation and Sweden. It has been a joy working with those previously known and meeting others that I hadn't had the privilege of getting to know over the years. I greatly appreciate all who so faithfully show up to volunteer in our Research Library. We have a wonderful group of women and men, each sharing their individual top-notch skills, talents, knowledge & time with us. We have some who are teachers or snowbirds that help out in the summer and others who help out more often during other times of the year. This makes for year round coverage but we are always looking for new and additional volunteers. Each is an invaluable asset; we could not accomplish what we do without them!

We continue to receive new donations on a fairly regular basis. Come in and see what's new to assist you with your research- - in genealogy or with a subject focused project.

I have been here 6 ¹/₂ years already and have seen the Carver County Historical Society grow immensely. The New Year always starts with the annual reports such as the Minnesota sales tax, reviewing the insurance policies, reviewing the Federal & State Labor Law posters, and filling out the Minnesota Counties Insurance Trust payroll audit and estimate, EDP and Risk Assessment reports and the PERA Annual Exclusion report. Also, I clear out last year's accounts payable files in prep for the New Year.

Our new website is up and running with our online gift shop and membership forms available to print and fill out to send back. You also have the option to pay right there via Square (a credit card service) or send a check in the mail. We have our first book, *Two Wars on the Frontier*, on Amazon for purchase. Many of our patrons call to order or come in to visit and purchase items on site. I've been making many trips to the post office lately to mail out orders.

The gift shop area is expanding with the addition of the Andrew Peterson booklet, Two Wars on the Frontier, Chaska Alphabet, Shadows of Time, and Waconia Paradise of the Northwest: The Town and its People. Hopefully, the new gift shop case will be built in 2015. It should provide more room for the current books and items, and have enough room for future items.


During 2014, Chaska Historical added 6 new members giving them a total of 121 members, Chanhassen Historical added 5 new members for a total of 163 members, Wilkommen NYA added 12 new members for a total of 70 members, and Watertown Historical added 6 new members for a total of 28 members. The CCHS added 65 new members for a total of 391. That's 773 total members. Welcome all!!!

In January of 2015, we are looking into sending renewal letters via email to members who have provided email addresses. Then, they can pay by credit card, or check if they wish. This will cut down on postage costs in the future. Also, with our photo collection coming online, members are able to use the passcode they receive to access our photo database. The passcodes were sent out in mid-January. Thereafter, when renewing, the new year's code will be found on your renewal membership card.

We participated in the Give to the Max Day, which was on November 13th. That date corresponded with our Annual Fund drive. We received \$5959 in Annual Fund drive donations with an additional \$805 designated for the Endowment Fund. This is the most successful fund drive we have ever had.

Carver County Historical Society will celebrate its 75th year in 2015, and it will be exciting to help celebrate the occasion. I'm sure O.D. Sell would be proud.

My hope is that we may be able to get Grossology, but the price is prohibitive. A major sponsor would be needed. Who knows what the future holds?



By the Numbers

Grants Received in 2014

- * A \$28,500 long range planning grant for the Peterson Farm was awarded in December of 2014, but the work has just started. The grant must be completed by the end of March, 2015.
- * A grant to develop a new website was awarded for \$9,850. This project was completed the middle of November. The change is immense and includes the ability to research photos, plat maps and access to a variety of history resources. This project was initiated by surveys sent out to members over a two year period, asking what they would like to see us focus on. Members will receive or have already received a postcard with their passcode in the mail. This passcode will allow members to research our photo database. A project a long time in the making. Photos can be researched without a membership at Carver County Libraries and our research Library.
- * The 1878 German Reading Society banner is being restored thanks to a \$8155 grant. The Society was located in the city of Carver. Plans are to unveil the newly restored banner in September, in the city of Carver in partnership with the Carver Libraries.
- * A \$3,000 MNopedia grant was received to add articles to the Minnesota Historical Society MNopedia website. Lindsay Marshall is working on this project
- During the fall of 2014, the American Association of State and Local History held its 2014 national conference in St. Paul. We received \$585 to send Eve Weipert and Heidi Gould to the conference. Wendy Petersen Biorn also attend as co-chair of the conference's Marketing and Public Relations committee.



* A \$9825 Legacy grant was submitted in January of 2015, to replace one of the old microfilm readers which had decided to retire itself. The much needed new microfilm machine should arrive in February.
