Ronald Holtmeier Wins Prudential Volunteer Award

Ron Holtmeier won the Prudential CARES Volunteer Grant for volunteer services with CCHS on July 2, 2008. With the award, comes a \$250 donation to the Carver County Historical Society in Ron's name.

Ron started volunteering after he retired in 1979 for the University of Minnesota Agricultural Student Training program at the St Paul campus. The program was designed for international students to live and work at a farm for 9 months. Following the farm visit they would return to the campus for academic work. Ron and his wife Harriet would pick up the students at the airport on Saturday, providing housing for a few days then take them to the St. Paul campus

the following week. From there the students would go to farms in Minnesota. Ron tells of one student from Estonia who knew no English and went to work for a dairy farmer near Mankato. The farmer told him to do something with the bulk tank and not understanding the student mistakenly drained 2000 gallons of milk. The farmer was obviously not happy with this but was at least understanding. The famer not only kept the student, he paid for English tutoring. Ron has kept in touch with many of the students over the years, including his first student from Finland.

Ron became involved with the Carver County Historical Society by an invitation from Jo Mihelich. Ron Holtmeier winner of Specifically, he has been busy promoting the Prudential volunteer CARE Andrew Peterson farm and working with the

Nordic Club. Last summer Ron, his wife Harriet and a number of other wonderful volunteers spent a lot of time planning to bring over 27 people from Sweden for a tour of Carver County, the Peterson Farm and parts of the US.

> The year before he helped with the four Swedes who came to rebuild the Peterson granary. He has enjoyed working with everyone involved in regard to the Peterson farm but most enjoys the visitors from other countries. He is CCHS's liaison with the Peterson farm and gives tours of the farm when requested.

Ron's advice to others thinking about volunteering is just do it. "It is fun!"

The Generations Project

Sometime last summer a lady walked into the museum. To be honest, I cannot tell you why or what it was about her, but she had something special. She had an aura, that exuded happiness and friendliness. The lady's name was Ruth Tremblay. The aura she has is one that makes everyone she comes in contact with comfortable. Ruth and I learned that we shared something special that day. The love for old barns. So began Ruth's adventure of documenting Carver County barns.

The name, "Generations Project" was bestowed by Ruth in tribute to the generations of families who continue to live on the family farm. The project is based on a survey designed by The National Barn Alliance who's lofty goal is to document all barns in the United States. The project is not just about taking photos of the barns, it is about documenting the history of the generations of people who live, worked and homesteaded on the farm. My concern from a history and preservation stand point is that in time we will loose the family farm and the stories and images would go with them. Ruth and I don't kid ourselves into believing that we can save all the barns, or even a fraction of them, but it would sure be nice to save the nicest example of each. For the barns we can't save, we can save their image and the oral history of the generations who lived there.

One of the predominate questions I receive is, "what are you going to do with the information." This is a valid question as I fully understand the need for privacy. There will be several copies of the information made. The National Barn Alliance, State Historic Preservation Office, Carver County, Ruth and the Carver County Historical Society will each have a copy of the information. In each case the purpose of having the information is protecting the barns. For example, as the County plans for transportation needs, they will be able to refer to the barn survey with our hope of avoiding the barn, moving it or if it is determined a barn can not be saved a through record of the barn will exist in perpetuity.

We at CCHS owe Ruth and her efforts to document the barns of Carver County more than we can possibly return or thank her for. Please let Ruth know just how much she is appreciated by visiting

her at the log granary at the Carver County fair in Waconia, August 6-10th. If you would like your barn documented she generously gifts the owner a copy of the photo for allowing permission to photograph. Her photographs will be available for sale at the fair and at CCHS. Ruth has generously donated back a portion of each sale to CCHS.



Learn about **Andrew Peterson**, one of Carver County's earliest farmers, in the place where he lived and worked for over 40 years. Known for more than just his work in apple breeding and horticulture, Peterson also kept copious notes and journals. These provide some of the best known documentation of early Swedish immigrant life in America. His journals were used by Swedish novelist Vilhelm Moberg to craft a story of Swedish immigration in his novels *The Emigrants, Unto a Good Land, The Settlers,* and *Last Letter Home.*


